#### **Prostate Cancer**

One of our members posted a precautionary tale regarding needing to get tested for prostate cancer, this is a summary of tale – since having several PSA (Prostate-Specific Antigen) blood tests, and each time the level has

been above normal, resulting in furthermore intrusive examinations, however these tests proved normal. Advice from the GP was to have further tests in 6 months. However, on the advice of a locum doctor after testing a referral was made to a Urologist with a recommendation that an MRI scan be performed. The scan showed abnormalities on both lobes of the prostate and an immediate biopsy was booked.

Despite many re-assurances to the contrary, prostate cancer was diagnosed, albeit it was in the early stages which meant that it is curable. It is important that members who think they may be in a situation similar should request from their GP a PSA test to check. Do not be fooled by the non-appearance of symptoms. Further from this information I had already been in touch with Mr Farron MP for the Kendal area who has supported regular testing for prostate cancer and the lack of facilities of treatment centres in the south of the county.



On 11 November 2024, during a debate in the House of Commons on

the Budget's impact on rural affairs Mr Farron asked the following:

"We must also bear in mind that some of the longest and most unacceptable waiting times for cancer treatment are in rural communities. We very much welcome the £70 million for radiotherapy that was announced just before the Budget—much to Mr Speaker's chagrin—but will the Secretary of State bear in mind that 3.5 million people in the country, most of them in rural communities, live in radiotherapy deserts? Half of us will have cancer at some point in our lives, and half of those people should receive radiotherapy treatment, yet barely a guarter of them do. One reason for that is that communities such as mine are just too far from that treatment. Will the Government ensure that some of that money goes towards providing satellite units in Kendal and other parts of rural Britain?"

I have spoken to Mr Farron since he asked the question and assured him of our support in this matter and he in turn has agreed to keep me informed of any progress in trying to get a radiotherapy department in the Kendal area to service the South of the county. It is unacceptable that people may have to travel from the Barrow area to Preston for treatment however excellent that treatment is.

When meeting with Ministers or MP's in my role as Vice President I will be raising this issue whenever I can.

# Clever People Die Sooner if they have Dementia

"Phenomenon discovered by scientists shows those who spend longer in education deteriorate faster" Sunday telegraph 26 January 2025
People who spend more years at school or in education are likely to deteriorate from the neurodegenerative disease faster according to the biggest study of its kind, dubbed "cognitive reserve paradigm".



A person's cognitive reserve is their brain's ability to cope and keep working, including in the face of diseases such as dementia and Alzheimer's

Research found that paradoxically, these patients go downhill faster if they do get a diagnosis.

Many brilliant minds have been hit by dementia, although there is limited information on affected individuals in the public domain. Experts believe it is because people of higher intelligence are more resilient to cognitive decline and able to function for longer without signs or symptoms of the disease onsetting.

Dementia is one of the leading causes of death in the UK. These are just

some of those who have been affected – Terry Pratchett – British author, Dame Iris Murdoch – novelist and winner of the Booker and Whitbread prizes, Robin Williams – Oscar winning actor, Lorna Spode – BBC Musician.

Alzheimer's research UK encourages people to keep mentally active throughout life to boost their brain health.

Now when I cannot remember a name or something I've done I will remember that I could possibly live longer because I didn't have a brilliant mind.
