#### From John McCarthy the Lead Chaplain to Merseyside Police:

am a member of the Merseyside Branch of NARPO, having retired from Merseyside Police, after thirty years' service, in 2015.

After retiring I decided to volunteer in whatever areas in life that I could, to give back to society after the huge benefit I had received through a very fulfilling career, which enabled me to lead a comfortable life. This led me to being ordained as a Deacon in the Archdiocese of Liverpool, then becoming one of Merseyside Police's Volunteer Chaplains and eventually becoming the Lead Chaplain.

I have purposely declared being a Deacon, to identify myself as a person of Faith and then make the point that chaplains are not here to preach or try to convert anyone. It is rare that you will get a chaplain to talk about Faith.

It is important that I state this as I still meet Police Officers and Police Staff who have that understanding that Chaplains 'Do Faith,' we don't. We can, but we don't.

The role of a chaplain is to offer vocational care to all police personnel and their families regardless of religious affiliation or lack thereof. Chaplaincy's sole aim is to support all people to flourish. That is to accompany them and walk alongside them in all that they do. In simplistic terms this means being there and being present.

Where a chaplain comes into their own is when they meet someone and listen. Chaplains listen, allowing a person to talk through their concerns and anxieties or even just to have a timely and purposeful conversation. They do all of this in confidence and without judgement.

Despite chaplains being professionals, they will never try to solve any concerns or anxieties raised but will guide and support an individual to the most appropriate Service that can assist them.

My experience of Chaplaincy as a serving officer was that there were a handful of chaplains that existed but were not seen very often. Merseyside Police currently has twenty chaplains, including myself, spread right across Merseyside. My aim is that every Police establishment on Merseyside will have its own chaplain and that that chaplain becomes one of the Team in that place.
