Metal Detecting exploits from Dave Newnham

Have you ever watched 'The Detectorists' on TV? If not, for your info, it is a comedy/drama following two metal detectorists, played by Mackenzie Crook and Toby Jones. Well worth a watch too. I took up metal detecting quite a few years back, and weather permitting can be seen trudging over local fields swinging what looks to be like a frying pan on a long stick across the ground. Local farmers have given me permission to detect on their land and I notify them of any 'finds' I make. Anything of value is split 50/50 with them. [Most of the time their view is that if I am stupid enough to wander over muddy fields then I am welcome to it!]

Metal detecting has it's critics, normally from the archaeologists, who see it as damaging our heritage; assume that all metal detectorists are treasure hunters and that we are stepping on their professional toes. The reality is that metal detecting 'finds' account for over 80% of articles recorded on the National Portable Antiquities System yearly, and that 'new historical sites' are often first discovered by responsible detectorists who initially find the first coins or artefacts.

I have found some really fascinating objects over the years. Currently, with a few other detectorists I am exploring adjacent farms to create a picture of the varying habitation/development of the land over the past 2000 years.
